Field Crews: Our field crews get to experience many different aspects of resource conservation: building and maintaining trails, clearing trees in the backcountry, burn area rehab after wildland fire, facilities maintenance, watershed restoration, fencing, invasive plant mitigation, planting, and more. [Fuels & Fire Crews:](#) These crews work on forest fuels mitigation projects with an emphasis on heavy chainsaw use. They also receive their basic wildland fire qualifications (S190, S130, Red Card, S212). This is designed to give participants exposure to the world of wildland fire and the importance of fuels mitigation in climate health.

Specifically, these crews work with a diverse range of stakeholders (private, government, and non-profit) in order to achieve large scale land conservation efforts. [Forestry Crews:](#) Forestry crews offer opportunities to gain considerable field experience in a variety of Forest Service timber management activities on both the Flathead and Kootenai National Forests. These crews engage with agency Timber, Fire and Silviculture personnel, and receive training in Tree Species ID, Timber Stand Assessment, Tree Marking, Timber Sale Boundary Marking, Tree Planting, Silviculture Prescriptions, Reforestation Plot Surveying, Chainsaw Operations/Maintenance, Precommercial Thinning, Fireline/Fuelbreak Operations, Biochar generation, and more.
